COVID-19 – NESS MANDATE

- Your governments are working together to ensure Canadians are safe against COVID-19.
- The provinces and territories are the **first front** for providing PPE for their workers. The federal stockpile is a resource for local authorities, should they have a sudden surge and need to supplement their own stock of PPE.
- The federal stockpile is **not** set up to hold PPE for the entire country, but instead serves as a backstop for urgent and time-sensitive needs.
- To ensure we have enough PPE in Canada, we work with provinces and territories to assess their needs, and support suppliers and industry to increase domestic production.

If pressed on PPE supply:

- Provinces and territories maintain their own stockpiles of PPE.
- How much each province or territory has is up to their own discretion, based on the needs of their health system
- So far, we have been able to fill all requests for PPE from the provinces and territories.

If pressed on NESS mandate:

- The mandate of the national emergency stockpile is not to supply PPE.
- That is because we work with the provinces and territories to supplement their own supplies.
- Rather, the stockpile focuses on national supplies of treatments like antivirals, to ensure a swift response to
 possible outbreaks of treatable viruses.

COVID-19 – DATA MODELLING INITIATIVE (\$10M over 2 years)

- As we look to lifting public health measures, our response needs to focus on who in our country is most at risk
- On April 23, the Prime Minister announced \$10M for a Canadian data monitoring initiative.
- This initiative will establish a coordinated approach to COVID-19 modeling and access to data sets, through a national network of experts.
- The better we understand the virus, its spread, and its impact on different groups, the better we can fight it and eventually defeat it.

If pressed on how it will work:

- We need to invest in research and data, so we can understand how the virus has spread in Canada and how it is affecting vulnerable populations
- At least one million samples will be collected and tested over the next two years

• Through this large-scale testing, we can track the virus in the general population **and** in specific populations, including health care workers, Indigenous communities, and the elderly.

If pressed on data collection:

• Through this large-scale testing, we will be collecting **disaggregated data** that will help us understand the impact of COVID-19 on vulnerable populations

COVID-19 – WHO CONCERNS

- Canada is a founding member and a strong supporter of the WHO.
- The WHO is ensuring that the technical advice provided to countries is based on the best available science and evidence.
- Further, the WHO has an important leadership and coordination role in the global COVID-19 response, through
 driving efforts towards new vaccines and treatments to helping the most vulnerable countries with their
 response.
- We are all learning more about the virus and the effectiveness of measures to address the pandemic every day.

If pressed: confidence in the WHO

- The entire global community, including the WHO, is learning more about the virus every day.
- Now is the time to work together. An infectious disease anywhere can quickly become an infectious disease everywhere.
- While the international community works together to find a vaccine, **cooperation has never been more important**.
- There will many lessons that we will learn from this pandemic, and Canada would support a review of the global response post-crisis.

If pressed on cuts to the WHO:

We have no plans to cut funding to the WHO.

COVID-19 – WHO AT HESA

- We thank the Standing Committee on Health for their important work in studying Canada's response to COVID-19.
- Committees are independent and inviting witnesses is their decision alone.
- I am thankful for the Health committee's work and collaboration, but how they proceed with this matter is a decision for them.

If pressed:

- The Health committee is doing important work, which I am grateful for.
- How they proceed with this matter is up to them.

Bonus:

COVID-19 - REMDESIVIR

- Canada is supporting the WHO and international efforts to find treatments for COVID-19.
- Last week, the Prime Minister announced **\$1.1B** in funding for Canadian researchers, so that we can work on finding effective treatments and vaccines for COVID-19.
- We are funding multiple promising Canadian research projects, including three studies using Remdesivir as a
 potential treatment.
- While we continue to support the Canadian and international scientific community in their research for treatment, we recommend that Canadians do not take these medications for illnesses outside of their prescribed use.
