Mr. Speaker, once again I need to highlight what I just said, which is that in the interest of full transparency we revealed on our website at the end of July all of our contracts and suppliers. I would like to take issue therefore with the insinuation that we are not acting in the interest of transparency, and I will say that we now have over two billion items of PPE in this country for Canadians, for front-line health care workers, and we will continue to act with vigour and diligence on their behalf.

Mr. Speaker, our government has made it a priority to let Canadians know what we have been doing to protect them. Since this past April, we have taken steps to be as transparent as possible and to keep Canadians up-to-date on our work.

We have made publicly available the progress we are making on procuring key COVID-19 supplies. As orders have arrived, and continue to arrive, Canadians have been able to consult the PSPC website for a regularly updated overview of purchases and deliveries.

In addition, as part of our commitment to transparency and accountability, we are publicly disclosing contracting information to the fullest extent possible while protecting our supply chain. This information, which is available on the contracting information page of the PSPC website, also includes the names of suppliers and the amounts of the contracts.

On top of this, Canadians have been updated on purchases of PPE, as well as new manufacturing contracts with Canadian and international companies, on a regular basis through ministerial press conferences.

Most recently, we have been providing updates on agreements the Government has signed with a number of companies to secure Canada's access to the most promising vaccines being developed around the world.

As we have been reporting to Canadians, we are also moving fast to ensure that Canada has access to the most effective and efficient testing solutions possible as the technology quickly evolves. Along the way, we have been informing Canadians on the companies we have made agreements with, as well as the types and quantities of kits we are procuring.

Mr. Speaker, it is no secret that COVID cases are on the rise in parts of the country. Now more than ever, our procurement efforts must continue with full force.

That is why we continue to aggressively pursue vaccines, PPE, test kits and other supplies. I can assure this House that our procurement teams are working around the clock to move this complex work forward.

These are extraordinary times, and as this Government works to ensure Canadians are supported and safe, we will also continue to keep Canadians informed on what we are doing to keep them safe.
